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GENERAL CAMPOREE INFORMATION

What is Camporee?

Camporee is an exciting weekend where Scouts from many Troops and Crews join to compete in challenging events, apply leadership skills and engage in fellowship with Scouts outside of their own Troop. The most important part of each Camporee is for Scouts and Scouters to have FUN! The events are designed to test various Scout Skills and encourage teamwork among the competing cohort. The Golden West District Camporee will be staffed by Scouts and Scouters from units throughout the District. This year our Camporee adventure will be led by Mr. Dan Moran and Mr. Bruce Finnson.

This camporee will require scouts to focus on scout skills. It is strongly recommended that scouts practice these skills prior to the camporee. The events focus on Scouting Skills requirements associated with the Trail to First Class, in other words, the basics. The competition will be by Patrol and Campsite Inspection will be by Troop. We hope to have the events staffed as much as possible by our older Scouts with the assistance of adult leaders. The Patrol Method and Youth Leadership are keystones in Scouting.

Check-in: Units may begin checking in at 4:00 PM Friday evening, absolutely no arrival prior to 3 pm, no check in after 8:00 pm.

COVID-19 Guidelines

Currently we have no COVID-19 Restrictions in place, but we are prepared to pivot in case BA.2 makes a surge. *More details to be forthcoming if such need arises.*

General Event Notes

- Troop campsites will be in designated areas, camping outside these areas is prohibited.
- There is a fire ban in effect and Troops will be NOT allowed to have campfires of any kind. Only propane stoves are permitted.

• Please notify the Staff in advance of any of your scouts' special medical needs. We need to be able to recognize any special conditions. Your cooperation could help prevent serious problems.

• Every Scout and Leader must be currently registered with the Boy Scouts of America. There can be no exceptions. Every leader must have completed Youth Protection Training and California's Mandated Reporter Training.

• Day-Only Adult Visitors (registered and trained) will be allowed to visit the camporee on Saturday and stay for the campfire for a reduced fee of \$15. They will not, however, be allowed to stay overnight at the camporee or participate in any activities beyond volunteering to help with Troop events.

- Each troop is responsible for the Scouts in that troop.
- Each patrol must have a patrol flag. Specific details about the flag are provided later in the guidebook.

• Take nothing but pictures, leave nothing but footprints. Leave No Trace principles should be followed by everyone in attendance.

• It is strongly suggested that the Scout Handbook and Field Book be used as reference during the event.

The Scout Oath and Law will govern all participants.

Camporee regulations are necessary to ensure that every Scout and Leader has not only an enjoyable experience, but a safe one as well. The above list is not intended to be complete but is important and must be agreed upon by the adult and boy leaders of the troop to ensure the safety of all present.

Camporee Theme

Every Camporee has a fun Theme to promote spirit within the Troops. The Camporee theme this year is "**Star Wars**" based loosely on the popular movies, television series and games! Units are encouraged to incorporate the Star Wars theme into their cohort flags and event t-shirts.

Camporee Location – Firestone Scout Reservation

- Camping: Memorial Mesa Events: Kiwanisland (1/8 mile down from Memorial Mesa)

- Expect that you <u>will</u> be able to drive to your event site for <u>event setup</u>. The Camporee staff will coordinate a drop off zone for easy access.
- Troop Trailers will be need to be stored within your campsite, not at event sites. Please plan accordingly.
- **Registration**: The Council registration will be coordinated via Black Pug.

Camp Cost

This year's Camporee cost structure will follow a modified cost structure than utilized previously.

- **\$35** All Scouts attending the weekend event, even if for a portion.
- **\$30** All Scouters attending the weekend event.
- **\$20** All Scouters staffing the weekend event.
- **\$15** All Scouters attending the event for Saturday day only.

Logistics

Patrol Method

The patrol method will be the means of adventure for the weekend. Patrols will be camping, cooking, and competing as individual patrols. The patrol should be led by the patrol leader with no interference from any adults with the exception in circumstances where the immediate health and safety of the campers are a concern. Points will be deducted from the patrol for instances of adult interference. If an adult is witnessed to continue to interfere with the patrol the adult will be asked to provide his or her services elsewhere within camp.

Adults

Each patrol will need to have a minimum of two adults on premise at Camporee at all times. One Adult advisor should accompany them throughout the weekend. Their primary duty will be to provide loose supervision and to photograph the patrol. The patrol Advisers will camp near but outside the patrol campsites. All other adults will be expected to help out on staff throughout the weekend and will camp within the adult area of their Troop's designated campsite. Remember we are here to provide a program for the youth, not to provide a getaway for the adults.

Parking

Parking will be limited to the parking area of Memorial Mesa. It is strongly encouraged to carpool to and from Camporee. There will be absolutely NO PARKING within the camp/activity areas. Each unit will be allowed one vehicle one trip to drop off and pick up equipment for the camping area. Campers will need to be prepared to carry their personal gear in from the parking area. Trailers will need to be parked in the designated Trailer Parking Area. Please follow directions of Staff directing parking. Event set-up will be down the road in Kiwanisland and a limited number of vehicles may be used to transport materials down to that event location.

Garbage and Recyclables

Pack it in, Pack it out...Sustainably. Throughout the weekend each patrol should keep garbage and recyclables separated. We will have areas throughout the camporee area to deposit your recyclable material. Units should be prepared to haul out all recyclable and non-recyclable garbage created by their patrols in their patrol sites. No trash can be left at Firestone Scout Reservation.

Check-In

Check in will take place Friday evening between 4 and 8 PM at Camping Headquarters, located to the north side of the primary parking lot. To check in all units should have ready the Patrol Registration Form, all permission slips, and medical records for all participating campers. Units will also need any fees

due for additional campers not registered on Black Pug during online registration. Every effort should be made to arrive as a unit, and check-in must be done as a unit as well.

Participant Records

Scoutmasters are responsible for ensuring any adult attending Camporee has current Youth Protection Training and has completed California's Mandated Reporter Training.

All units must have the permission slips and medical forms for each camper. Be prepared to show them when checking in. Permission forms are attached to this leader's guide.

• Every Scout under the age of 18 who plans to participate in the archery ranges, rifle ranges, or slingshot must have a completed firearms permission form. No form, no participation in these events, no exceptions.

• Every participant shall have a BSA Health Form (Parts A & B).

Camp Medic

We will have qualified medical personnel on-site for serious incidents or emergencies, but youth should be encouraged to use their First Aid Skills to address any minor issues that are within their training. Each Troop *must* bring a Troop First Aid kit. Stacy Byone will be there Friday through Sunday. Sandy Vo has also.

Event Site Assignments

Proposed Troop Event Sites will be discussed in Zoom meeting to balance needs of events for spacing.

Meals

Troops are responsible for **ALL** meals for the youth in their unit. Patrols should cook, eat, and clean-up as a group. This *includes* Friday evening dinner.

The Saturday schedule will be reviewed by the SPLs and their staff. Any lastminute revisions to the schedule will be announced at this meeting.

Spirit & Event Information

Patrol Flags and Yells

Each Troop will divide their Scouts into Camporee patrols (not necessarily the same patrol in their Troop). These Camporee patrols will be encouraged to make a patrol flag and come up with a patrol yell. Patrol names *could* tie into the Camporee Theme (Star Wars), but that is not *required*.

The flags will be judged at the opening ceremony on Saturday morning. There is no specific flag guidelines. It can be the patrol's customary flag, or one incorporating the Star Wars theme. The best-looking patrol flag, in the opinion of the youth SPL staff, will win.

Camporee Campfire

Each Patrol should plan on performing a skit in the Camporee Campfire on Saturday night. While fire conditions do not permit us to have a traditional wood fire, we will have a propane fire and a formal campfire hosted by our youth leadership. Spirit points will be awarded for participation and for the best skits. We sincerely want this to be a memorable campfire and getting the youth excited about it and participating is paramount to this success.

EVENT DETAILS

Patrol/Team Specification

Each patrol will have a minimum of 4 scouts and maximum of 8 scouts. Scouts will be grouped together in patrols based on the number of participants. All members of the patrol must be properly clothed for the weather. Each team must submit a patrol roster at check-in on Friday night. Some events may require teams with fewer than 8 people present to have one or more team members repeat a portion of the challenge.

Individual Equipment for the Events

Each Youth should have the following items in their backpack and carry the pack during the events. Scout Handbook, paper or notebook, pen or pencil, 10 kitchen matches, small personal first-aid kit, Bandana or neckerchief, tinder for fire starting, water bottle for staying hydrated, compass and rainwear if the weather calls for it. Camp Sites


There will be specific camping space available and assigned to each Troop in the location provided to us Firestone Scout Reservation. Troops must camp together in their designated area. ONLY vehicles pulling Unit trailers will be permitted into the camping area and that will be to drop the trailer. All vehicles must remain in the designated parking area throughout the event. The access road to the camping area is steep and needs to be kept free of heavy traffic. The access road shall not be blocked at any time during the event, emergency access to the camping area must be available at all times.

Each Unit is responsible for its own camping equipment. At no time should scouts or leaders walk through another campsite without requesting "permission to enter."

Water: There is potable water located throughout the campground and additional temporary bathrooms and wash stations will be provided in addition to two permanent pit toilets at Memorial Mesa and at Kiwanisland.

Gateways: Troops are *highly* encouraged to build Gateways denoting the entrance to their campsite. They can vary from simple to elaborate, but should be obvious to the untrained eye.

A few examples are included below:



Campsite Inspections: Campsites will be assigned at check-in. Though the sites will be assigned, the care and preparation of the site is up to the troop. Campsites should have a perimeter established. At check-in your packet will have your inspection sheet inside. Make sure it is posted in your site so that a staff member can record your score and mark your score sheet. Campsite inspections will take place on Saturday morning and all campsites should be in compliance with BSA Guidelines.

General Event Listing / Descriptions

Below is a list of general descriptions of the Events your Scouts will do. More detailed information to come.

Events: First Aid, Go-Kart Lashing Event, BSA Knowledge & Trivia (including Leave No Trace principles), Fire Building, Knots Competition, Campsite Set-up/Tent Building, Orienteering/Navigation, a Cooking Competition, Archery and Rifle Shooting. The shooting sports will have points awarded for participation only.

Event Volunteers

Even more so than with previous District Camporee events, *Troops are needed to volunteer to make this Camporee successful*. We encourage Troops to honor service hours for their volunteering Scouts. Event volunteers should be prepared to provide oversight to the Troop planned events. Event documentation & scoring methods are due to the adult coordinators by April 20th. Event scoring methods will be verified by the SPL and Adult Coordinators. The SPL team will contact the event Council Liaison if there are any questions or concerns regarding how an event is scored.

Guidelines for Troops on running Events

Events need to be well-tested and conducted with *consistency*. Troops will be responsible for all items needed to run the event. They will also be responsible to score their own event and provide score sheets to the Camporee staff. Assistance can be provided in the development of scoring sheets and criteria. Troops should plan on providing hand sanitizer and any necessary cleaning equipment just as a general precaution.

Event Planning

- Enable the youth to develop and execute an event using E.D.G.E. methodology.
- Establish idea(s)
- Identify Requirements and understand timeline
- Document how the event will be run, including:
 - o Number of staff needed to run the event smoothly
 - Staging area for patrols who are waiting
 - o Event Layout
 - Where staff needed to be stationed
 - Scoring methodology
 - Equipment needed

Competitive Patrol Events

The competitive events will focus on the scout skills used in Scouting Adventures. Every patrol will get a base score for participating with additional points available for the patrols averaged knowledge of the subject as well as Scout Spirit. Each patrol will have a schedule given to them Saturday Morning at the Opening Flag Ceremony. Each event will be roughly 25 minutes in total length; 5 minutes for introduction and 20 minutes to complete the event. Shooting events will take longer due to mandatory safety instruction. Each event should have the capacity to handle up to 3-5 patrols in each scheduled slot.

- Land Navigation Will include subject matter in Topographical Maps, Compass, GPS (T671)
- First Aid Will include subject matter in First Aid Skills in Trail to 1st Class & Beyond (T440)
- Fire Starting Will test the patrol's ability to successfully start a cooking fire (T660)
- Lashings Go-Karting Will test the patrol's knowledge of lashings and teamwork (T670)
- Knots Will involve the knots and lashings in the Trail to 1st Class (T270)
- Scout Essentials Will test the patrol's knowledge of the Scout Essentials & LNT (T1004)
- Campsite Set-up Will test the patrol's knowledge and speed at tent and campsite set-up (T658)
- Bucket Relay Teamwork, strategic planning and general fitness will be tested (T578)
- Cooking Each patrol will cook the same dish to be judged in a cooking competition (T657)
- Mystery Event Teamwork, coordination and physical agility event (fun) (T295)


Scoring: Patrols will be award for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in each event based on their scores. In addition, each patrol will receive a Novice, Bronze, Silver, or Gold rating for each event, based on the patrol's overall knowledge of each skill. This rating will be provided to the patrol during Camporee recap for their reference to better themselves as a patrol after camporee.


Awards

Awards will be presented for *overall* First, Second and Third place.








Kiwanisland – Events location
